We've A Story to Tell!

"We'veastory to tell to the nations." These words are the beginning words of a great missionary hymn. They state in poetic fashion the commission our Jesus Christ gave to His church. We have just journeyed through a study that challenged us to be Bible stewards of our time, talent and treasure. I would like to suggest another area of stewardship. This area of stewardship concerns our Christian testimony, the truth, the message of Jesus Christ. "We've a story to tell to the nations," this is really "Hope Worth Giving." You and I have been made the stewards of the gospel story.

It is this gospel that offers real, authentic hope. This gospel is about God putting His love for us out in the open. In spite of our sins and because of our sins, God demonstrated His love for us. The truth of the story is that while we were yet on the wrong side of God, He loved us. He knew we had no way of getting right with Him, except He intervene. And intervene He did!

This intervention was absolutely necessary because sin left us without strength, without the power to correct our situation. Our sin separated us from God,

Spiritual Gifts Within the Community

Goal: To learn what true community is and to practice biblical *Koinonia*.

Lesson Objective: To experience koinonia using spiritual gifts within the church community based on biblical principles with others who share a common life in Jesus Christ.

Scripture: "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms. (I Peter 4:10)

Lesson: Previous lessons have dealt with Koinonia which is translated from the original language as fellowship with one another within the body of Christ. This month's lesson will provide a deeper meaning on Koinonia as experiential fellowship. "We are not meant to be passive participants or, to use a business metaphor, silent partners in the partnership of the gospel. Rather God intends for all Christians to be active participants in the body, working partners in the enterprise of the gospel." God equips us with the Gift of His Holy Spirit to fulfill the work of the church, which is the mandate Jesus gave us; "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, "teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Amen [Matthew 28:19-20, NKJV] Obedience to Jesus' mandate is an assigned responsibility for every Christian.

Each believer has a unique spiritual gift that the Holy Spirit individually measured out according to God's sovereign will and design. Spiritual gifts are graciously given and cannot be earned. There are no exceptions to using the gifts; every member has a function within the body that God has assigned him to fulfill. We must use our spiritual gifts to minister to one another, not to exalt ourselves but exemplify loving concern for fellow believers.

FUNCTION IN THE BODY

We as the Church are many members but one unified body. The human body is used as a metaphor for the church throughout Scripture. God assigns work for every believer to fulfill His divine purpose in the body. Therefore, all of the parts are vital in the function of the body of Christ.

"A spiritual gift is an ability given by God and empowered by the Holy Spirit to perform the specific function within the body that God has assigned each of us." An example would be the way the Holy Spirit arranges prayer warriors with the gift of prayer as background support to those who are more visible in missionary or ministerial work with the gifts to evangelize, preach, or disciple. The apostle Paul often used the analogy of the body in his letters to the churches to emphasize the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives. He states:

> For as we have many members in one body, but all the members do not have the same function, so we, being many, are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another. Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, let us use them..." [Romans 12:4-6 NKJV]

SHARING OUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS

We are to use our Spiritual Gifts to minister and encourage one another. Our gifts which were so graciously given to us were not for self- edification but are to strengthen and edify the entire body of Christ. When we serve as good stewards, we share in experiential fellowship or working partnership with one another as we use our spiritual gifts. . "The fellowship with spiritual gifts is for the benefit of the rest of the body and for the advancement of the kingdom of God."

> A demonstration of the Spirit is given to each person to produce what is beneficial. [1 Corinthians 12:7, NLT]

> Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms. [1 Peter 4:10]

Sharing spiritual gifts requires an understanding of God's principle for fellowship with other Christians. Koinonia is concerned with community and fellowship within the body of Christ where we share the life we have in common in Christ. Spiritual gifts are God given graces for serving others. When spiritual gifts are used for fame, personal fulfillment and recognition, they are abused or wrongly applied. Paul challenges believers to consider their use of spiritual gifts with caution.

> Because of the privilege and authority God has given me, I give each of you this warning: Don't think you are better than you really are. Be honest in your evaluation of yourselves, measuring yourselves by the faith God has given us. [Romans 12:3 NLT]

because a Holy God will not allow sin to exist in His presence. It would have been a violation of His person to simply overlook our sins. His Holiness required remedy for the offense. This speaks to the Justice of God. Today we often like to lift up and highlight only one attribute of God, we prefer to present Him solely as the God of love. God is love, but He is so much more. Among the many attributes of God is His Holiness and His Justice. We must never select our favorite divine attribute and present God as only a God of that trait. God is always all of who He is. Any other image of God is idolatry. God's love for us, did not cancel the moral requirements needed to satisfy His Holiness and Justice. Mankind had sinned against God. Mankind had rebelled against God's rightful authority of mankind. God had already gone on record declaring that the man, woman, boy, or girl that sins, that refuses His rightful authority over their life, would die! But God loved mankind! However, His Holiness had been offended and Justice demanded mankind's death. The debt had to be paid. Mankind was morally bankrupt and had nothing worthy to offer as payment. But God loved mankind! In order not to violate His own person, He paid our debt. Paul puts it like this: "Christ arrives right on time to make this happen. He didn't, and doesn't, wait for us to get ready. He presented himself for this sacrificial death when we were far too weak and rebellious to do anything to get ourselves ready. And even if we hadn't been so weak, we wouldn't have known what to do anyway. We can understand someone dying for a person worth dying for, and we can understand how someone good and noble could inspire us to selfless sacrifice. But God put his love on the line for us by offering his Son in sacrificial death while we were of no use whatever to him. " (Romans 5:6-8, The Message)

Because you and I have placed our confidence in God's demonstrated love for us, the sacrifice of His Son, Jesus Christ, that has made us right with God, "we've a story to tell to the nations." The remedy for mankind's dilemma is the Hope that is found exclusively in Jesus Christ. The remedy for the plight of our communities is the gospel of Jesus Christ. The remedy for our dysfunctional society and families is the soul-saving message of Jesus Christ. If you are a believer in Jesus Christ, you have a story to tell. You and I must obey the commission given to us by our risen Savior. This is what Jesus said: *"When Jesus came near, He spoke to them. He said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. So wherever you go, make disciples of all nations: Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Teach them to do everything I have commanded you. "And remember that I am always with you until the end of time."" (Matthew 28:18–20, GW)*

The hymn writer H. Ernest Nichol gives us these words:

We've a story to tell to the nations that shall turn their hearts to the right, a story of truth and mercy, a story of peace and light, a story of peace and light.

We've a song to be sung to the nations that shall lift their hearts to the Lord; a song that shall conquer evil and shatter the spear and sword, and shatter the spear and sword.

We've a message to give to the nations that the Lord who reigneth above hath sent us His Son to save us and show us that God is love, and show us that God is love.

We've a Savior to show to the nations who the path of sorrow hath trod, that all of the world's great peoples might come to the truth of God, might come to the truth of God.

Chorus:

For the darkness shall turn to dawning, and the dawning to noon-day bright, and Christ's great kingdom shall come to earth, the kingdom of love and light.



EVANGELISM IS ABOUT LISTENING

Listen now to my voice; I will give you counsel, and God will be with you. Exodus 18:19

Many people are longing to find someone who will listen to their problems. If you want to be an effective evangelist it is essential that you develop the art of effective listening. Jesus knew the best ways to minister to people by listening. Luke 24:17-24:20 There are a number of tools that help you develop your listening skills.

1. STOP TALKING

Don't talk, listen. When somebody else is talking listen to what they are saying, do not interrupt, talk over them or finish their sentences for them. Stop, just listen. When the other person has finished talking you may need to clarify to ensure you have received their message accurately.

2. PREPARE YOURSELF TO LISTEN

Pray "God I pray for wisdom as I listen, I pray for an opportunity out of this time to share you with them." Focus on the speaker. Put other things out of your mind. Don't get stuck on your "script" – try to put other thoughts out of your mind and concentrate on the messages that are being communicated.

Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving. At the same time, pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison— that I may make it clear, which is how I ought to speak... Colossians 4:2-6

3. PUT THE PERSON AT EASE

Help the person to feel free to speak. Remember their needs and concerns. Nod or use other gestures or words to encourage them to continue. Maintain eye contact but don't stare – show you are listening and understanding what is being said.

4. BE PATIENT

- a. When you share Christ you need to pause and listen to the other person's thoughts and concerns? Evangelism needs to be less about telling and more about listening: think conversation not proclamation.
- b. A pause, even a long pause, does not necessarily mean that the person has finished. Be patient and let the person continue in their own time, sometimes it takes time to formulate what to say and how to say it. Never interrupt or finish a sentence for someone.

5. AVOID PERSONAL PREJUDICE

Try to be impartial. Don't become irritated and don't let the person's habits or mannerisms distract you from what they are really saying. Everybody has a different way of speaking. Focus on what is being said not the manner in which it is said.

6. LISTEN FOR IDEAS - NOT JUST WORDS

You need to get the whole picture, not just isolated bits and pieces. Maybe one of the most difficult aspects of listening is the ability to link together pieces of information to reveal the ideas of others. With proper concentration, letting go of distractions, and focus this becomes easier.

7. EMPATHY

Listen from the heart. Empathy for the individual speaking is another critical factor in developing effective listening skills. If you listen with your heart and not your head, you will listen more clearly, because you won't be thinking about yourself.

8. WAIT AND WATCH FOR NON-VERBAL COMMUNICATION

Gestures, facial expressions, and eye-movements can all be important. We don't just listen with our ears but also with our eyes – watch and pick up the additional information being transmitted via non-verbal communication. Non-verbal communications include facial expressions, the tone and pitch of the voice, gestures displayed through body language and the physical distance between the communicators. These non-verbal signals can give clues and additional information and meaning over and above spoken (verbal) communication

- a. A good listener will listen not only to what is being said, but also to what is left unsaid or only partially said.
- b. Effective listening involves observing body language and noticing inconsistencies between verbal and non-verbal messages. For example, if someone tells you that they are happy with their life but through gritted teeth or with tears filling their eyes, you should consider that the verbal and non-verbal messages are in conflict, they maybe don't mean what they say.

Listen and pay attention. Evangelism isn't just waiting for an opportunity to speak, it needs to be a real conversation and exchange of ideas. When you ask a question like, "Are you happy in your life?" or "Do you ever feel as if you're missing out on something?" Really listen to the answer someone gives. Aside from giving them the feeling that they have a willing listener, you need to pay attention to what they're saying to learn to respond accurately and convincingly.

Evangelism needs to be less about telling and more about listening: think conversation not proclamation. You don't always have to give your two cents. Sometimes you can just listen. Sometimes that's all a person needs. So listen. To the whole thing. Without interruption. Without judgment.

You cannot connect the gospel to someone's needs and desires if you don't know what they are. Listening closely will help you to gauge the person's interest and open them up even more. Effective listening starts with you. To become an effective listener, open your ears, shut your mouth, and open your heart. Once you start truly listening to what people are saying vs. simply hearing them, you will become a more effective evangelist.
