

The Fellowship of Serving

Goal: To learn what true community is and to practice biblical Koinonia.

Objective: To experience koinonia by actively desiring to know Christ and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of serving.

Scripture: "You...were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the sinful nature; rather, serve one another in love." (Galatians 5:13)

Overview:

We have explored various expressions of koinonia over the months to include union with God, sharing a common life, partnership in the gospel and the fellowship of suffering. This month we expand our concept of koinonia by studying the fellowship of serving. As a biblical community, we share a common life, in Christ, with other believers through relationship, partnership, and fellowship. One primary meaning of koinonia is sharing together with others what we have. One of the most valuable things we can share in the body of Christ is ourselves: our time, our talents, and our energy to serve one another.

There is no greater model and teacher of service than our Lord Jesus Christ who in His incarnation took on the very nature of a servant. [Phil. 2:7] We saw this demonstrated when He washed the feet of His disciples and blessed two fish and five barley loaves of bread to feed more than five thousand hungry people. Although He Himself is the sovereign God, creator and sustainer of the universe, He performed acts of service in spite of His greatness and authority. Regardless, of any position we hold, we too must serve one another.

For who is greater, he who sits at the table, or he who serves? Is it not he who sits at the table? Yet, I am among you as the One who serves. [NKJV, Luke 22:27]

This brings us to the biblical characteristics of a servant. First of all, one must have a servant's attitude. This allows us to do even the most menial tasks willingly and in a spirit of love. No special talents or abilities are required. Contrary to the world's way of thinking, one of the main characteristics of a servant is that he serves downward. Within the body of Christ, no one is too important to serve others. Another important character trait in serving others is faithfulness or trustworthiness. Just because we volunteer our time to serve the church or others, we may be prone to think that faithfulness is not important, but it is God who requires that we be faithful. It is difficult for the body of Christ to maintain itself or move forward if the people who serve are inconsistent, uncommitted, or fail to fulfill their responsibilities.

Moreover, it is required in stewards that one be found faithful. [NKJV, 1 Corinthians 4:2]

How can we engage in the fellowship of serving in a manner that will bring glory to God? God must give us a servant attitude. We must allow Him to change us through His Word, Bible study, prayer, and obedience so that we may serve Him and the body of Christ in a spirit of love towards one another. God can get no glory from the one who serves with arrogance, impatience, and in a mean spirit.

Whatever capacity that we serve in brings its own set of challenges. Consider the ushers who are the doorkeepers in the house of God. If people are inconsiderate and disrespectful towards them as they try to perform their tasks, it creates tension and animosity in the body of Christ. In whatever area we serve, we must learn to cope with and pray regarding the inconsideration of others. There are many who work tirelessly behind the scenes keeping the church safe, the yards clean, or handling logistical details for events, but may not receive a single 'thank you' for their relentless service. Yet, we must be prepared to accept ingratitude or being taken for granted. To all who serve, we must accept our role, persevere, and serve as unto the Lord. When being served, we need to express gratitude to them and be sensitive to the demands we make on others.

Blessed are those servants whom the master, when he comes, will find watching. Assuredly, I say to you that he will gird himself and have them sit down to eat, and will come and serve them. [NKJV, Luke 12:37]

Discussion Question #1:

What is the world's usual attitude toward servanthood in contrast to Jesus' attitude? (Luke 22:27)

Discussion Question #2:

Discuss ways in which we can serve in the body of Christ that will contribute to the fellowship of serving.

Points to Ponder:

Will Christ be pleased with my attitude and manner of serving?

Helpful Scripture Passages:

Philippians 2:7, John 13:15, 1 Corinthians 4:2, Luke 12:37

Closing Prayer:

Dear Lord, we thank You for giving Your Son, Jesus as our perfect model for serving others. Help us to grow in our efforts to reach others so that they might know You. Help us not to yield to the world's standard of service but to that of Jesus'. May we experience Your blessing as we seek to glorify You in all of our earnest deeds. In Jesus the Christ's name we pray! Amen!

rediscover the "importance of us."

"The human body has many parts, but the many parts make up one whole body. So it is with the body of Christ." 1 Corinthians 12:12 NLT

- 1) It takes all of us to make up the whole. -- One body many members. The church is a community, a fellowship, a koinonia. We must never forget our common sharing and common characteristics. It is the awareness and practice of this koinonia that promotes a healthy body.
- 2) What must we recognize in order to promote and maintain a healthy body?
 - a) Senseless Drawbacks -- There are two drawbacks that we should avoid. We should avoid these because they are ridiculous.
 - i) The first senseless drawback is the mindset of inferiority. "If the foot says, "I am not a part of the body because I am not a hand," that does not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear says, "I am not part of the body because I am not an eye," would that make it any less a part of the body?" (1 Corinthians 12:15-16, NLT) Some people fail to understand the importance of us because they have an inferiority complex. An inferiority complex will lead you to two negative, non-productive habits. These habits are self-exclusion and ridiculous envy. Self-exclusion says I have nothing to offer. Therefore, I have no importance. The person who excludes themselves due to inferiority says, "they don't need me." This person also has the habit of irrational envy. They suffer from the "I can't-i-tus". "I wish I could, but since I can't do that, I won't do anything".
 - ii) The second senseless drawback is the mindset of superiority. "The eye can never say to the hand, "I don't need you." The head can't say to the feet, "I don't need you." In fact, some parts of the body that seem weakest and least important are actually the most necessary." (1 Corinthians 12:21–22, NLT) While the person with an inferiority complex says "they don't need me," the person with a superiority complex says "I don't need them." This person practices the elimination of others and the elevation of self.
 - **b) Sovereign Design** The reason the previous drawbacks are senseless is because of Sover-

- eign Design. "But our bodies have many parts, and God has put each part just where he wants it." (1 Corinthians 12:18, NLT) You are where you are and you can do what you can do by the Sovereign Sagacity of God. The Divine wisdom of mutual reliance runs counter to the isolationist, autonomous attitude that says -- "leave me alone." God created interdependence. Without interdependence, the body would never function properly. The same is true for the church locally and at large.
- c) Sure Display When we practice the "importance of us" we will have before us a sure display of what God intends for the church. "...While the more honorable parts do not require this special care. So God has put the body together such that extra honor and care are given to those parts that have less dignity. This makes for harmony among the members, so that all the members care for each other. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it, and if one part is honored, all the parts are glad." (1 Corinthians 12:24-26, NLT) When we practice the "importance of us," we will discover the wonder of mutual support. We will discover that we are not alone on our journey. We will have a new attitude about life, about ministry. We will have a "we are in this together attitude." When we practice the "importance of us," we have a "what happens to you happens to me" attitude. We will weep with those who weep and rejoice with those who rejoice. We will remember that ". All of us together are Christ's body, and each of us is a part of it.

I need you; you need me. We're all a part of God's body. Stand with me, agree with me. We're all a part of God's body.

It is his will, that every need be supplied. You are important to me, I need you to survive. You are important to me, I need you to survive.


