I Trust God!

What do you mean when you say "I trust God?" This is a phrase that is easily spoken but rarely practiced. It is often expressed by those who continue to worry. To worry is not to trust God, and to trust God is not to worry. We often trust God's ability to do anything as long as what He does is according to our agenda. It is not difficult to trust God as long as He is working our plan. But is this really trust? For sure, it is not total trust. To trust God totally is not just to trust His ability, but to trust His wisdom. Trusting God's wisdom is to realize that He knows more about our situation than we do. It is to accept the fact that He knows what is best because He is omniscient. When we say we trust God and seek to require Him to work by our plans, we are telling God we know more than He does. We also are limiting the outcome to the finiteness of our understanding. This really is a feeble attempt to control God by attempting to instruct Him on how to work out our situation. We only want God to use His power the way we have predetermined. This is to say to God, I know what needs to be done, but I don't have the ability to do it. Trusting God is to understand that He knows what we don't know, and He has options we don't have. Wow, could it be that there are options that are beyond our comprehension? Could it be that God sees what we don't see and can do what we can't do?

To trust God requires humbling ourselves to say: "Nevertheless, not my will but Your will be done." You and I must recognize that we often cheat ourselves of the more excellent, better, and more beneficial outcomes to our situations when we fail to trust God. We do this by closing our minds to any solution that is not born in our minds. When we do this, I wonder can this really be called trust? I am not suggesting that we should not bring to God our desires, plans, and hopes.

What Does Good Expect of Us?

Have you ever thought about what God expects of us -- what He wants us to do? Pray? Yes. Worship Him? Yes. Acknowledge Him? Yes. Obey Him? Most certainly. There is one more thing He is undeniably interested in -- that is to speak up and be accountable to Him when the opportunity arises.

One of the greatest demonstrations of being accountable to God occurred at home when I was a young girl, and I have never forgotten it. This one dramatic incident became a guiding light of my life.

All my immediate family lived under one roof. We were an extended family: mother, father, grandmother, grandfather, aunt, and my cousins, all under one roof. We all knew one another's business. Nothing was secret, nothing was private. Now that I think about it, living with all my close relatives was probably a good thing. One day, my aunt got married. Her husband joined the rest of us living in the same house. He was, however, not like us. He was a Jehovah Witness, and he converted my aunt to being a Jehovah Witness.

Now, my grandmother had been the organist of a Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia before marrying my grandfather. She had always been a Baptist. She was educated and talented, but very quiet. I learned as I grew up that I was a lot like her, except I did attend a Baptist church, while she, after marrying my grandfather, seldom left the house. I knew she was a woman of faith who loved the Lord.

One day, my new uncle started talking to my grandmother about Jehovah. He proceeded to describe Jehovah as the Jehovah Witnesses describe him. He denied that Jesus Christ was the Son of God. He said it was not God's Son who died on Calvary. Reading from a Jehovah Witness book, he was attempting to make my grandmother deny her faith in Jesus. My grandmother rose from her chair, straightened up her small frame, and started marching around the dining room table. She reminded me of Joshua marching around the walls of Jericho. She was glaring at my new uncle and holding her Bible in her hand. I would not say she was angry, but I would say she was impressive.

Raising her voice like a trumpet and slamming down her book on the dining room table, she told my uncle that she was a Baptist, believed that Jesus Christ was Lord, that it was Jesus Christ who died on Calvary, not some imaginary figure and it was Jesus Christ who was raised from the dead and now sits at the right hand of God. She said it was nobody but Jesus who saved her from sin and death. What's more, she told him he was never going to make her believe anything else and to never talk to her again about being a Jehovah Witness. And he never did.

What neither my uncle nor my grandmother knew-- is that I was in a room nearby, taking in every word. I was a little girl hearing this extraordinary, small, quiet woman, stand up tall -- raise her voice and witness to her new son in law about her faith.

She may have been talking to my uncle, but she was also talking to me unaware. She made such an early impression on me by speaking up about her faith that it has become a life-long lesson for me. Her demonstration of faith mattered.

When my grandmother marched around that table and proclaimed the name of Jesus, she taught me that God is looking for accountability from those who claim to love Him. Accountability demands action. Can we be counted on to stand up and tell the life-saving story of Jesus when we are challenged? God will provide the power in us as He did in my grandmother. Just stand up for Him and you will be amazed at what God can do through you.

Writer's Ministry: I Will Not Let My Church Be About Me!

If you have ever been around small children, you know that one of their favorite words to say is “mine.” Small children tend to be self-centered; they see the world from their perspective. They want things their way, and if it can't be their way, you can be prepared for them to display their displeasure with a tantrum.

Most people are aware of this fact and are very understanding when they observe a small child throwing a tantrum. It would be very disturbing to witness an adult engaging in the same behavior because most adults understand that they can't always have it their way. A mature adult recognizes that family and community often take precedence over our individual preferences or needs. Even more so, a mature Christian understands that he or she is a part of God's community—the church.

In our effort to function our best in the church, we have come to understand that we, the church, are part of the Body of Christ. Knowing this gives us a whole new perspective. This can mean several things. First, it suggests that my body, my physical presence, thoughts, desires, and preferences are only part of the whole; the Body of Christ meaning the church. Another implication is the ‘Body’ is not solely me. It consists of a Body of Christian believers. That means we need to be mindful of the thoughts, wishes, and desires of others.

The most important implication is that the ‘Body’ is not mine, Susie's, or John's, or any church officer. It is the Body of Christ. It is holy. It is in the divine plan of God. The desired pattern or design has been set by Him. He takes preeminence over all. What He wants and desires for us individually and collectively as a whole is what really matters.

Growing up in a family, most of us have had conflicts with our siblings or parents where we want our way. Soon, we learned that for the family to function, we had to make some concessions, compromise, or conform to our parents' expectations. What we fail to understand is that we can't use human and worldly patterns and apply them to the Body of Christ—which is divinely ordained by God. These patterns will always fall woefully short of what God has in mind. God's thoughts and ways are higher than man's thoughts and ways.

“Do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interest, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.” (Philippians 2:3-8, ESV Anglicized).

Philippians 2:3-8, gives us insight into what enables us to not only live in community with each other as the church, but also actualize God's very purpose for the church on earth. Consider the fact that when Jesus came to earth, He gave up His heavenly glory and set aside some privileges to become a servant in the likeness of men (Philippians 2:5-8). Two characteristics that Jesus demonstrates in this passage are humility and servanthood. These characteristics are directly opposite to the consumer mentality that many believers hold about church membership. As one who professes that Jesus has saved them, we must do a self-check on two levels—a heart check and a head check. A heart check, because we must always strive to grow in our relationship with Christ; a head check, because we must grow in our understanding of God's purpose for His church.

Being a Christian requires the submission of one's individual will to the lordship of Christ. We are either in Christ on His terms (by grace) or we aren't. To hold the view that being part of the body of Christ involves an exchange process is an error. Being saved by grace means we had nothing to exchange for salvation; it is a gift of God (Ephesians 2:8-10).

And yet, many believers demand that the church cater to their preferences and desires BEFORE they will serve! Our serving ought to be in response to God's mercy, grace, and love for us as demonstrated by Christ's death on the cross. The hymn writer states, “Jesus paid it all; All to HIM I owe...” Being a functional member of the Body of Christ is not a consumer transaction.

Thom S. Rainer, states in his book, “As a Church member, my motivation should not be to get my preference to the top of the list. I am supposed to be last, not first, I am supposed to be a servant instead of seeking to be served” (*I Am A Church Member*, pg. 35). Paul writes, “By God's grace and mighty power, I have been given the privilege of serving Him by spreading this Good News” (Ephesians 3:7, NLT). Rainer's research indicates ten dominant behavior patterns are present when church members insist that a church cater to their preferences and desires. Is it the music, the worship experience, demands for pastoral attention, budget concerns, or programming that has become an issue that keeps you from serving?

Church membership from a biblical perspective is about servanthood, giving, and putting others first. Philippians 2 is not only a description of the obedience of Christ; it is also an example for us to follow.

Jesus is our model; we are here to serve! Mark 10:45, NIV tells us, “For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.” We are servants of the Most High God. We must put into practice His will for our lives as individuals and as a corporate body. We cannot impact our communities and the unsaved if we fail to understand that we are servants who must relinquish our “me-ness,” so that the Body of Christ is elevated in our lives. We must be focused on serving others and putting our personal needs and wants aside.

However, in bringing our desires, plans, and hopes, we must be willing to yield them to God. Yielding our plans, hopes, and desires to God does not necessarily mean that He will not fulfill them. Yielding our plans, hopes, and desires to God means that we recognize that He is God and He always does what is best. Yielding our plans, hopes, and desires to God means never ending up with less than He plans, hopes, and desires for us.

We often don't trust people when we doubt their intention to do us good. When it comes to God, we should never doubt God's intention to do us good. God has demonstrated His intention on Calvary. God's intention really is His love for us. God has put His love on display because He intends to do us good. In fact, since the beginning of time, God has always intended good toward us. We should trust God completely because He not only wants to do us good, He is the only one who can and will do us good all the time. We must trust God without reservation.

I trust God, do you? I trust not only His ability but also trust His wisdom, His unfailing love for me, His unimpeachable integrity, and His eternal intention to do me good. I trust God, do you? I trust God with my life, my present, my plans, my desires, my hopes, my future, my problems, my circumstances, my doubts, and my fears. What about you? What do you trust God with?

'Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus, just to take Him at His word,
just to rest upon His promise, just to know, "Thus saith the Lord."

O, how sweet to trust in Jesus, just to trust His cleansing blood,
just in simple faith to plunge me 'neath the healing, cleansing flood!

Yes, 'tis sweet to trust in Jesus, just from sin and self to cease,
just from Jesus simply taking life and rest and joy and peace.

I'm so glad I learned to trust Thee, Precious Jesus, Savior, Friend;
and I know that Thou art with me, wilt be with me to the end.
